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Attorney General Bill McCollum: Here's a typical MySpace site for somebody, and again I don't want to block it from you. But ahh, I'm going to come over to the other side for a second because it is a little bit easier. Well, I won't either, I better stay over there. I'll get in trouble; I got to stand in front of you guys. I'm sorry about that Mr. Thompson. But anyways this typical MySpace site, you got all types of things that are on there. Let's go to the next one to show you what's there. Look at the different things that are put up there, I don't know how much you can read of this but the alcohol drink this person put up there Coke, Rum and Vodka. Born where: Buffalo, New York. Current location: Jacksonville, Florida. Do you want to tell bad guys where you are, they can go to your MySpace site and see this. Let's go to the next slide. This slide shows you, you know you've ever smoked/use pot. Whatever else, those kinds of questions are there as well that are very important. Down here at the bottom though look look at the one over there, sexual preference: both. And then down here at the bottom how do you want to die? You probably can't see that, someone of you can't what this person said, murdered. Now what's that an invitation to? It's an invitation to several things. What do you what to say, Denver what do you want to say about that?

Child: Saying that I want to be killed.

Attorney General Bill McCollum: Yea, it's almost saying I want to kill. But it also an invitation, there are other invitations up here. What else is dangerous about all this? Who else wants to tell me, what else is dangerous?

Child: They can find out where you are.

Attorney General Bill McCollum: They can find out where you are from this, and their also enticed by what you put up there. What you use as a name, what you put up there that says you have these interests. Well the figure if you put this up, you may figure its cool, you know you're just talking to friends and nobody is going to pay attention, but the bad guy who might be up there on the internet, he's going to target you if you put the wrong stuff up there. What the message that's out there that's the issue, what's the message? Can't take it back. What you put up you can't take back. Let's talk about that just for a minute, umm were talking now about pictures maybe, things you post on the internet, things you say about yourself, things like that that were up there that may have been silly. That someone said that somebody said that they have both sex as a preference. Future employer, your girlfriend's parents, your grandmother, your next door neighbor, colleges, universities go on space like MySpace and they actually today look at this stuff. We've had the Ms. Nevada losing her title over fairly small minor pictures. Not explicit sex pictures just put them up there. We've had Ms. New Jersey got to keep her title but almost lost it over pictures that were silly, that she put up as a teenager, as a youngster like you guys. But later on they came back to haunt her. Once you post something you can't take it

back, umm.

Child: Are there boy predators?

Attorney General Bill McCollum: There are definitely boy predators as well and so let go to the next presentation. We are going to go here and show you something about that that I think illustrate this more. It takes a second to load this video up but it's going to get it up. You're going to see it, just a second. I know it takes a little while to go through this process, but I want you to see this video, if we can get it up there. Well we're having a little technical glitch but it's going to come. Well we went back up, but we didn't get the video, didn't we? We will get there in just a minute. Let me tell you a story, while we're doing that. When she gets the video up we will show it. But there's a fellow that we prosecuted the other day out of Panama City who's a lawyer. This lawyer, this lawyer is 42 years old. He went upon the internet and he pretended to be a 15 years old girl, and he lured 11 teenage boys to go before a webcam and make explicit sexual pictures of themselves on that webcam. And he downloaded those pictures and he was going to use them to trade, in fact he did, he sent those pictures all over the place. The good news is that our Cyber Crime Unit prosecuted him and he got 14 years in prison and is going to lose his license to practice law forever. The bad news is that's a reality check for a second. Look who the victim were in that case. They weren't girls, they were boys in that sense. Okay here we go to this video.

[Video plays]

(Music and faint voices)

Narrator: Once a post your image online, you can't take it back. Anyone can see it, family, friends, anyone. Remember think before you post.

[Video ends]

Attorney General Bill McCollum: While you're into that one, if you would run the other one too. Let's just run the other video while we're there. It's a simpler message. I think this makes the point to you guys. Let's take a look at this one.

[Video starts to play]

Guy in video: Hey Sarah.

Girl 1: Oh my gosh he is so cute.

Girl 2: How do you know Kyle?

Coach in background: Come on guys do it like I taught you.

Coach: Love the new tattoo Sarah. Let's go!

Boy in background: That's the girl I was telling you about. The girl in the pictures.

Boy 2: Oh, that's Sarah?

Man: Hey Sarah! What color underwear today?

Man 2: Hey Sarah so when you gonna post something new?

Narrator: Anything you post online, anyone can see it. Family, friends...

Man 1: See you later Sarah.

Narrator: Even not so friendly people. Think before you post.

[Video ends]

Attorney General Bill McCollum: The messages to both of those two are pretty clear guys, and that's what I was trying to say to you earlier. Anything that post, anything you put up there, any pictures you put up there particular anybody can see. That was the answer to the question back there when you said that you thought it was secure. So you really got to watch out for what you're posting up there. You know who this woman is? Anybody here know who she woman is? Who is she?

Child: Frenchie!

Attorney General Bill McCollum: It's Frenchie, that's right. Let's go to Frenchie's next picture, Frenchie Davis. That's right, look at that picture. Frenchie Davis was an American idol, who was kicked off the show because that was found in her background she previously had posted that picture, cost her her American Idol spot. Umm, you can't take it back and that basically what this is because internet can be there forever. And that the other thing by the way, somebody as a friend can take your picture. Well because you know when you say it's forever, what do you mean by that? It goes into space, you can't really do. We have problem with child pornography, another area that I work in all the time and the victim just isn't the child at the time that something happens to them. The victim is the same child forever, every time that picture is reproduced. There's a new crime, there's a new victim, there's a new hurt, there's a new pain. When you post a picture it doesn't have to be one explicit, just anything that you wouldn't want someone else to see don't put it up on the internet. It's just a simple as that because your friends who you think are friends, we already talked about this. You may not know all of them, even some of them that you do know might well reproduce that picture and send it somewhere else and it's going to end up in a hand, or place where you don't want someday when you're older perhaps or even right now. You just never know where they are going to send it. So once you've posted a picture online, once you've posted anything online, just think about it who you want to see it. Now let's take a look at this, which group is most likely to be tricked and taken

advantage of on the internet by a predator? Guys we are going to vote on this. Boys? Or Girl? How many think its boys? Alright, put your hands down. How many think its girls? Wow! Look at the number they all think its girls. You know the answer to that question, it's 50/50. So about even and that's what I told you about the man who went and posed to be a little girl. They are people out there that want to get guys, want to get guys. They are horrible stories about guys who get caught and trapped into things they don't want to do. It's not just about girls; it's about boys and girls. Okay, so don't even forget that. You guys think you're safe out there it's not true. Somebody says that you may be taken advantage of by one of your friends as well. The whole cyber bullying thing is not why where her today but that's part of it. But it's more than that they are people out there who will use the information you give and do things to you.
