Dear Co-Workers :

It now seems that our long fight to secure unrestricted use of the ballot is about to be won. Negro citizens of Titusville broke into their City Primary last month; and we have every reason to believe that Brevard County Negro voters will be able to register as Democrats when the books open for the primaries next spring,

Our mext big job is to get our people properly organized, so that our voting will be more effective. We must try to get the masses of our people organized under one banner; and we must get prepared to trade our votes - not for a few drinks of liquor, or for a few dollars to be put into the pocket of some selfish Negro "politician" - but for equal opportunities and a fuller measure of justice for the masses of our people.

It was with this thought in mind that we organized the Progressive Voters' Loague of Florida in August, 1944. We felt the need of an organization whereby the political strength of Florida Negro citizens could be united. We could not use the NAACP for this purpose, because the constitution of this organization prohibits its endorsement of political candidates. We therefore decided to organize the Voters' League.

For your information, we are inclosing copy of a circular letter that explains the objectives of the Voters' League. We feel that the time is now ripe to get local units organized in our most populous communities. Will you help us to organize a unit in Cocoa?

I plan to be in your section of the county Sunday, Oct. 19, and I would like to discuss this matter with you. If possible, please meet us at the home of Mr. Nick Ford at 2:30 P. M. Sunday.



Same My present astimation is that more than 12 qualified Negro vaters were kept from voting because the pells is Nims were closed before 5:00 P. M. When I learned about this, I went to the polls with three of the men who had been turned sway. I told the clerks that I understood that the sew law requires the pells to remain open until 7:00 P. M. The clerks send they know nothing about this, and that they closed at smadews. It was then 6:00 P. M. While we were there two other Negro voters came in to vote, and they were turned away, also. There were others who went there before 5:00 P. M. and were not parmitted to vote.

This is a bad practice. It seems that some officials in these small counties either do not know the state laws or they have little regard for them. You already know that they have not been issuing registration receipts to colored veters in this county. Is a close election is a small county like this, a dozen or two votes might make a big differency. This early closing could have been designed to catch related veters, because most of our men work until late.

De you have any enggretion as to how this might be cleared up? If meressary, we can get affidavite from some of these who were not permitted to you to day.

The Florida NAACP One-Day Emergency Conference

lust a few months ago we submitted a detailed report of our activities to the Sixth Amauel feeting of the Florida NAACF State Conference, which was held in Panama City, June 7 - 9. Our report for the intervening period, therefore, will be brief.

The program adopted in Panama City marks the beginning of a new era for the MAACP in Florida. Inder this program Florida becomes one of the first, if not the first state, to employ a full time executive secretary. The Conference approved a budget of \$7000 to launch this program and to finance the work for the first year. Hr. E. E. Broughton, Mrs. Viola T. Hill, Mr. Edward D. Davis, Mr. G. D. Rogers, and Rev. R. H. Johnson are members of the Budget Committee, whose task it is to help raise this fund.

The time between the Panama City Testing and our meeting to-day has been a period of transition. From Jupe 9 to Aug. 31 we continued to operate on a part-time basis, as we had done prior to that time. On Sept. I we began full-time work as executive secretary. On that came date by, Idward D. Davis of Ocala, who had unanimously been named president-elect at Panama City, assumed his new duties as the third president of the Florida State Conference. Thus, paraphrasing the words of the Apostle Paul, we may say : N. V., Griffin planted, Harry T. Moore watered, and new may Edward D. Davis help to produce the increase.

During this period of transition our work in Florida has continued its steady growth. At the time of our Panama City Meeting there were 50 branches in Florida. To-day it is our pleasure to report 60, or more, branches exattered from Pensacola to Key West. Among these new branches are Hamilton County, Sulphur Springs, Clewisten, Walton County, Hallandale, Clay County, and Deerfield. As a have often said, such progress is not the result of action by any one individual. It is esuable of the operations of a well-ciled machine, in which all parts are clicking smoothly. Among our co-workers who have helped to produce this increase are Mesers. E. K. Hass and R. A. Reddick of the Summance County Branch, Mr. Hilton Turner of Washington County, Mr. R. W. Davis and Mrs. Claudia W. Helland of Ft. Lauderdale, Rev. J. R. Thompson of Pompane, and Mr. N. S. Fennoll of Grange Park. Other workers are helping us to plant seeds in various sections of the ptate, and it is our hope that these will soon sprout and eventually bring forth much fruit.

Again the Crim Resper has visited our runks and cut down two of our veteram warriors. Since we left Panama City Mr. James Green of Pompano and Dr. E. D. Strickland of Sanford have passed to their reward. Tr. Creen has labored for the MACP since some of us were little boys, and for a number of years he were president of the Pompano Branch. Dr. Strickland was chairman of the Executive Committee of the Seminols County Branch, a Cold Certificate holder, and one of our most loyal supporters. The Florida State Conference mourns the passing of these two workers.

We are still deeply observed about the wave of lynching, mot violence, and police brutality that is threatening to engulf our Southland. Our hearts have been filled with horror as we read about the terrible common in Merce, Ga., in Patesburg, S. C., in Mindon, La., and in other places where the life of a Negro citizen is still a very chasp article.

And our own state is no exception. No positive action has yet been taken in the case of Leroy Bradwell, Negro veterns of "lidway, who disappeared on Jan. 7 while in the custody of Sheriff Edwards and Deputy Maple of Gadeden County. Through the co-operation of Pres. R. W. Davis and other members of the Ft. Lauderdele Branch we were able to get a personal interview with the mother and the sister of Lerey "redwell. We have submitted cepies of their affidavits to Goy. Coldwell, to the Department of Justice, and to our Legal Staff. It is our epision that Sheriff I do and Deputy Maple should be held responsible for the disappearance of "radwell. If this Negro cannot be found safe and sound, these two efficers should be suspended from effice. We recommend that the various religious, civic, and fraternal organizations in Florida be asked to potition Gov. Caldwell for each action.

During the past formenths soverel of our branches have employed lawyers to work on cause of police brutality and "legal lynchings", and the Ft. Lauderdale Branch is relaing messy to help appeal the convictions of Joe Forguson and James Andrew Manwell, accused of rape in Proward County. We also have been corresponding with lawyers with regard to the many cases of pelice by lity in Polk County, and we wish to discuss this natter with delegates from Polk County by Laws during this meeting.

Every community is "lorids is exposed to the dangers mostlessed above. Seeser or later your breach may be called upon to help light such cases. You should be ready with some memoy already on head. We recommend, therefore, that each breach reise a legal fund to be held in reserve until these emergencies arise. Our people must be trained to realize that one dellar per year from each member casest finance the full program of the NAACP. Hembers should make additional contributions, so that we can build up a "war chest" to help light the many battles that are ourse to confront us.

Amother matter that we have taken up during this period is the question of graduate and prefersional study for Florida Negro students. Several meaths ago the State Beard of Cestrol established a scholarship fund for the benefit of Negro students who have to leave Florida to obtain graduate and prefessional courses that white students are new getting at the University of Florida Unfortunately, the Scholarship Fund was exhausted before the opening of sumber schools this year, and many teachers were not able to get the benefit. This Fund has recently been replemished with \$10,000, and we urge that all eligible Negro students who had to leave Florida carlier this year to de graduate work, new make application for scholarship aid to Dr. William H. Gray, Jr., Florida A. & M. College. As you know, the NAACP upholds the principle that each state should provide within its own borders equal educational level, and we have reminded our State officials that we regard the Out-of-State Scholarship Program only as a temperary measure.

Again we wish to remind you of the great importance of our youth work. Let us train our young to to leve, and to work for, the NAACP. We urge every branch to help organize a youth council. It us got our young people ready for the Eighth Annual Youth Conference of the NAACP in New Orleans, Nov. 21 - 24, and for the Third Annual Meeting of the Florida State Conference of Youth Councils, which will be held in Nime next year.

We wish to express our deep appreciation for the many words of encouragement that have come to us from various members and friends over the state. Among these is a recent letter from Free. T. E. Combs of the Florida State Teachers' Association, pledging the full support of that organization to the program of the MAACP. We also are very grateful for the splendid co-eperation that we have received from our many branches, and we solicit your continued support in the work that lies shead.

The Negro vote means more today than ever before. In past years the Negro vote was brought into play primarily to defeat somebody, but today the Negro vote stands in a position to enable the Negro to integrate himself into every important phase of our government service.

The Negro possesses the balance of power if he will use it. In ten or twelve States the balance of power lies in the hands of the Negroes and they can determine the trend of the election.

For this reason the Executive Board of the State Progressive Voters League met at West Palm Beach, September 10, 1944 to devise plans by which our people might be informed of the importance of registering to become qualified to vote and to teach our people the necessity of using the ballot.

A Recommended Plan of Action:

We recommend that our various organizations cooperate in the following manner:

- 1. Churches- That the heads of the various denominations and auxiliaries be asked to send circular letters to their district and local heads, requesting that they encourage their members to register and vote. (Such letters might also be published in our papers)
- 2. That each presiding elder, moderator, and district superintendent will urge the pastors and local heads on his district to keep the matter of registering. to vote before their members.
 - 3. That each paster will take a little time at each service to teach his

- 4. That representatives from voters leagues, NAACP branches and other civic Organizations be given a little time during regular services to bring this matter before the people.
- 5. That each class leader, deacon, and club leader be asked to urge his members to register and vote.

- 1. That the head of each fraternal order or civic organization be asked to send circular letters to his local order in the same manner mentioned above.
- 2. That the local lodges or clubs will do everything possible to get their members qualified to vote.
